The Cygnets have a long-standing tradition of entertaining audiences with themed performances that highlight their athleticism, precision and passion for the sport.

They performed March 7 and March 8 and have one final show at the Central Branch in Painesville on March 9 at 2 p.m. with bleacher seating available.
